


## **MEASURES FOR RINGS**

VERY IMPORTANT: print this page in its original format. Uncheck "Fit to Page" of your printer. It is very important to print this document in 100% scale otherwise sizes will change.

Go to File, select the PRINT option and in paragraph Page Scaling be sure to select -None- before printing the document.

If you are not sure that the document is correctly printed just measure the pattern marked with 100 mm, it must measure exactly 10 cm. If you choose a wide ring or if you have wide knuckles, choose a measure bigger than the real one, this way you will ensure the size and get comfort.





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
## IF YOU DON'T HAVE A RING

Carefully cut the two figures. Cut the internal side marked with a scissors, create a ring with the paper. Be sure that the side of the measures remains outside. Tighten the paper to the contours of your finger.

Ask someone to pull in the opposite direction of the meter base, if you miss this operation you probably cannot have the right size.

If your finger is small, make sure that the paper ring can pass through your finger knuckle.

Note that there are two figures for measure sizes, one with the even sizes and with odd sizes
